The long-awaited **World Cup**, or in heli terms the **Euro Heli Series (EHS)**, was getting closer and closer. Everything was prepared to make this event run as smoothly as possible. With a lot of luck we were able to continue the game. I gave a **demo with my Alouette III**, which made for a nice intermezzo. The day ended with an extensive and tasty **BBQ**, where the atmosphere among the pilots and spectators was optimal.

# Sunday – Finals and friendship

Sunday started radiantly with a sun-drenched morning. The wind picked up a bit towards noon, but that didn't stop us from finishing the two finals smoothly. Finalist of this EHS was **Steve Roberts**, in second place Mark **Christy triumphed** and third place was **Thomas Brisset**.

Because some pilots still had a long return journey ahead of them, the finals were completed. Meanwhile, Ian (UK) showed an innovative system with camera and PC to

objectively assess **hovering figures**. This aroused a lot of interest, as it can help improve precision.
